WHY SHOULD LOCAL BUSINESSES SUPPORT INNOVATIVE GIFTED EDUCATION AT SILVERLEAF SCHOOL?

- Education of highly gifted students is unsupported in Public Schools. The Salem-Keizer budget for Talented and Gifted Education, district-wide, is less than \$500,000 while the budget for special education is almost \$40 million.
- American students rank 25th in math out of 27 industrialized countries. Only 11 percent of bachelor's degrees in the United States are in the sciences or engineering, compared with 23 percent in the rest of the world and 50 percent in China.
- Oregon has the second lowest graduation rate in the country. Of high school dropouts, 88% dropped out due to boredom yet had passing grades
- "The dropout rate of gifted and talented students from high school constitutes the loss of a national resource that must be addressed."
- ➤ 81% of teachers believe that "our advanced students need special attention they are the future leaders of this country, and their talents will enable us to compete in a global economy." vii
